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Students Are Reading All About It

NPA, the *Sentinel*, and school partner up to get Kids Scoop News into the hands of young people.

Sentinel made a special delivery to Arnold Public Schools last week. Students in grades 3rd, 4th, and 5th received the 24page October edition of Kid Scoop News featuring a colorful, Halloween themed front cover announcing what was inside..."Spooky Stories," inviting them to poke through the pages and find tips for writing stories that are silly and spooky; "Wrap Stars," where they could unravel the Mummy Mysteries to find out the history of mummies; and "Veggie Fear?" giving them a way to make veggie fear disappear with Count Alucard.

Each month throughout the school year, Debbie will make another delivery of the newspaper-for-kids that 'wraps' favorite topics in activities such as word searches, drawings and puzzles kids really love. Unlike digital devices, with Kid Scoop News, students get their own personal copy to hold and read, write in, cut up and take home.

It's a unique partnership between the Nebraska Press Asso-

'When the Nebraska Newspaper Association started contacting us about *Kids Scoop News* and how to get it into the school, they suggested different ways of finding the money needed to pay for it, including asking for donations from businesses, or applying for grants,' said Sentinel editor Janet Larreau. "I spoke with Arnold School Superintendent Joel Morgan and after he spoke with the elementary principal and the teachers, there was no hesitation on the school's part to fund it - something I gather that not all schools are willing to do. Our school is one of the greatest out there when it comes to working with the community."

Mr. Morgan said he feels *Kids* Scoop News is a great way for the school to be able to partner with The Arnold Sentinel to support literacy skills while creating an opportunity for the students.

"This is also an excellent ciation, the *Sentinel*, and the chance for students to bring

something home from school that could engage the entire family. Any opportunity for students to read is great, but to have informational stories, along with illustrations and activities is a great way to promote learning. The younger we learn to value news at any level, the more informed we will be,' he said.

Fourth grade teacher Katie Blowers plans to use the newspaper as an incentive for the kids to finish up their work.

Village Board Discusses Water Main Upgrades For New Housing

Infrastructure needed for building duplexes on the 300 block of South Walnut (south of the post office) was on the Village Board's October 10 regular meeting. Lane Chesley, who has purchased Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, and 6, Original Town, from the Arnold Economic Development Corporation, and Scott McDowell were at the meeting to discuss the water and sewer mains. Water Commissioner Rusty Wyckoff recommended that the main be upgraded from 2" to 6" on Walnut Street between 2nd and 3rd Avenue and 3rd Avenue to Highway 40, instead of 2" to 4", which had been discussed at the September meeting.

The Board then authorized Village Engineer Tom Werblow to submit the plans for the Water Improvement Project to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services to be approved. Superintendent Doug DeLaune said the sewer main is in the middle of Walnut Street and is 8", so nothing needs to be done at this time.

Insurance Premium Goes Down

Joe Bob Atkins of Arnold Insurance Agency gave Board members some good news while presenting the renewal of the Village's insurance policy. The premium for 2022-2023 is \$67,54.00, compared to the 2021-2022 premium totaling \$73,669.00. The decrease is mainly due to cancelling the Commercial Output Policy after the generators were re-

moved. All members present

approved renewal of the policy.

After presenting the Board with a list of claims that the Village had for 2021-2022, Atkins recommended monthly safety meetings be held, using safety manuals, logs, and videos that can be used. Superintendent DeLaune and Board member Donnell DeLosh will be on the committee.

Agreements Signed

Board members approved a agreement with Hanna:Keelan Associates P.C. to prepare a Blight/Substandard Determination Study for a fixed fee of \$6,000.00.

A Professional Service/Consultant Agreement was also approved with Hanna:Keelan Associates for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funded planning project. The planning project includes: Preparation of a new comprehensive plan, comprehensive community housing study, and review of local zoning and subdivision regula Village tions. The reimburse the consultant on an agreed payment schedule, and the total amount reimbursed will not exceed \$40,000.00. The effective date of the agreement will be October 10, 2022, with a termination date of August 10,

Board members voted to issue a check for \$5,000.00 to the Nebraska Community Founda-Arnold Community tion: Center Account - a sub-account of the Arnold Community Foundation Fund. The account raises funds for upkeep, main-

Association is celebrating their 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention WeekTM (FPW). This year's FPW campaign, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escapeTM", works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe from home

Today's homes burn faster than ever. You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance

Cassy went over information to help children plan their escape route out of their homes in case of a fire and to make sure they have two escape routes out of each room. Cassy and Andrew demonstrated to

The National Fire Prevention the kids what fire gear firefighters wear and what equipment they use. They also demonstrated how they would enter a room and locate someone who was trapped in a house and needed help out.

This year's 5th grade fire prevention t-shirt design winner was Jose Jr. Melendez.
