Village of Arnold Awarded Grant for Rural Workforce Housing Land Development

March 27, 2023 (LINCOLN, NEB.) - The Nebraska Department of Economic Development (DED) has awarded \$10,000,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) to twelve rural Nebraska communities. The Village of Arnold was among the

\$222,770.00.

The Rural Workforce Housing Land Development Program was created under LB 1014 to respond to the negative economic impacts of the coronhealth avirus public emergency. Awarded projects will revitalize communities

impacted by the pandemic by increasing long-term housing stability.

DED opened applications for the program on November 15, 2022. DED received 27 applications totaling over \$19 million in funding requests.

Arnold Community Housing Study Completed

Planning Commission Reviews Results

Current and future needs of housing in Arnold were the focus of a Planning Commission meeting held on March 27. Committee members reviewed parts of the 64-page Community Housing Study completed by Hanna-Keelan Associates, P.C., with Keith Carl.

Part of the housing study was compiled by a community-wide opinion survey that was returned by 120 people. A summary of the results of the housing portion of the survey was gone over at the meeting. Survey participants were asked to provide their opinion about a variety of community issues, needs, and opportunities including barriers to obtaining affordable owner or rental housing and specific housing types greatly needed throughout the community.

The city of Arnold, with major employers, also conducted a Workforce Housing Needs Survey to determine the specific renter and owner housing needs of the area's workforce. A total of 47 surveys were returned.

Section 3 of the study provides a Housing Needs Analysis and Target Demand for the community for new housing the funding entity a current development programs and activities. The section also identi-

rehabilitation and demolition demand for the Village during the next 10 years.

The population for the Village is projected to remain stable, but experience a slight increase by 2033. The study has found that new and innovative housing development programs will need to be implemented to supprojected population growth and ensure safe, decent and affordable housing is provided for both current and new residents. The study also concluded that currently, an owner "vacancy deficiency" exists in Arnold, where homes are neither for sale or rent for a number of reasons.

The greatest challenge for the Village during the next 10 years would be to develop housing units for workforce persons and families, elderly households and special populations. The study provides details on ways to meet the financial needs associated with improved housing.

Arnold Economic Development Director (AEDC) Director Chervl Carson said the study is a required component when communities seek applicable funding for their housing projects. Applications to funding sources are a competitive process and the study provides prospective of your communities' condition when they make

housing projects. Therefore, it was important for Arnold to upfor seeking future funding for any housing projects.
