Finch Library Roof Restored to Pass the Test of Time

Final phase completed thanks to hundreds of donators.

Finch Memorial Library's roof renovation project was completed towards the end of May, thanks to generous donations received from all across the country. The fundraiser to help replace the green clay tiles that were original to the almost 100

vear old roof was more successful than any library board member, or the director, imagined. The total estimated cost to replace the roof \$108,148.60. Insurance money took care of a large percentage of the cost, but an additional \$14,200.00 was needed. Board members and director Marcy

selling one tile for \$15.00 - in memory of someone or just as a donation. Word went out through the newspaper and in other ways, and people responded.

"We got money from everywhere," said library board member Rose Bierman. "The fundraiser started last year at Lucas came up with the idea of Alumni and we received money

from not only Arnold residents, but from Lincoln and Omaha, all over Nebraska, Texas, Colorado, Virginia, Washington, Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, and a lot from California. Many letters were received with those donations, with a common theme of they or their loved one had fun memories of coming here in their childhood."

Still, with all the donations, Rose said they are about \$736.00 short of the goal. The library also received a Custer County Foundation grant for a tankless hot water heater. The cost of the heater came in \$1,000.00 less than estimated, and that money was applied to the roof project.

As promised to those purchasing a tile in memory of some one, a memorial plaque will soon be created by Schoolhouse Graphic Products. More names could be added to the list of literally hundreds of names if additional tiles are purchased.

"The plaque will have to be in stalled outside, because it will be too large for the inside of the building. The love of the library is very evident in this fundraiser," said Rose.

Ryan Tullis, Project Manager for Weathercraft Roofing, said it was an exciting project and he was thankful to be part of it in his hometown.

"It is a rare opportunity to be working on these roofs because they do not need to be replaced very often," he said. "For example, this one was originally installed about 100 years ago. It's a bit of a puzzle because certain
