## **Street Project In Progress**

A Gomaco cement paver working on a block just east of Mills Hardware has been drawing a lot of attention as crews have been working to pour a ten-inch deep slab that will solve water issues that have been plaguing the street for years.

Village Superintendent Doug DeLaune said this has been the city's biggest street project in a long time.

"Water collects from clear up by the school and comes down into that area. That much water flow breaks down the asphalt. Because of the dip at the intersection of Carroll and Highway 92, trucks go around, and their weight was breaking it down, as well," he said. The block was supposed to be poured at eight inches, but that varied because of rain.

The pour was a learning experience for some of the kids at the school, as they were bussed down to watch the Gomaco and the workers in action.

#### School sets goal of fully functioning greenhouse by end of summer

The structure of Arnold Schools' new greenhouse is up and running, with one-third of the internal project currently completed.

The greenhouse is divided into three major parts - the planting/sale, an indoor raised community garden, and aquaponics.

The planting/sale area is complete. Students have been able to raise plants from seeds and take care of them in the garden, freeing up space in the Science lab. The sale area was used for last Saturday's plant sale. Money raised from the sales will go back into the classes' fund to help pay for future

projects. Throughout the school year, Mr. Mohr's welding class has been building the raised garden beds for the back of the greenhouse. Two beds have been completed. These beds will be used by the Applied Science Class and will provide food for the school lunch program. Any extras will be donated to the food bank or to Riverview Apartments.
