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A mountain of waste tires was being carried away on Monday, June 3, after area residents had taken full advantage of a three-day free tire collection event made possible by the Village of Arnold.

The Village was awarded a grant of \$24,248.00 through the NDEE's Waste Reduction & Recycling Incentive Fund for the clean-up. The NDEE's scrap tire funds are generated from a \$1.00 fee on new tires purchased in Nebraska. In 2024, enough funding was awarded across the state of Nebraska to clean up 5,461 tons of scrap tires. Funds will also be used to partially reimburse the cost of many products made from recycled scrap tires, such as artificial turf football, soccer, baseball, and softball fields, athletic running tracks, and playground surfacing.

NHS Senior Legacy Projects In the Works

One of the National brainstorming and came Honor Society's Senior Legacy Projects for 2024 got an early start on Memorial Day, as members who could be there power washed, scraped, and filled damaged mortar on the baby pool's south-facing wall. In the following days, the primed and then painted a large mural of a mermaid. It was step 1 of more murals and other projects the seniors are planning.

"When brainstorming ideas, our class thought it would be fun to do something to beautify the town," said Anna Tullis, who is co-chairing the mural project with Taylor Hanna-Miles. "(AEDC Director) Cheryl Carson gave us the idea to paint murals around town, as well as a list of places that would be options. Our first priority was the city pool. We all have spent a lot of time there, so it was important to make it fun for current and future swimmers."

Although all of the kids loved the Finding Nemo mural next to the baby pool, after many years of weather and sun, it was pretty faded. Pool manager Shavonne Schacher told the kids she is planning a mermaid theme for the pool, so they began up with a design. NHS members Riata Remund and Taylor Hanna-Miles redesigned the image using a computer program so that it could be projected on the wall to prepare for painting.

NHS members will be attending the June Village Board meeting to share their plans for painting murals on the outside of the city park's bathroom walls. The goal is to have all of the murals painted by the end of June. "We basically had a week

to actually complete the pool mural and had timing issues with Memorial Day. This is where the group really showed their drive and passion," said NHS Debby Moninger. "The project sounds simple, but behind-the-scenes, the pre-project phases are part of what make the projects successful. The Senior Legacy Projects started in 2010, and each year we focus on having a project that members can complete in one year, allowing them to learn the whole process. We have an awesome community that is always willing to help the youth achieve their goals in both in the community and the school."
