held on July 8, Arnold Village Board members voted to draft an agreement with Sal Hilderbrant of Sal's Dog Grooming/Pawsome Hotel to impound dogs at her facility.

At the start of discussion, Superintendent Doug DeLaune said that local veterinarian Merle Bierman preferred not to be involved with providing a facility, but De-Laune had contacted Hilderbrant, who was at the meeting. Hilderbrant said she is licensed with the Nebraska Department of Agriculture, and the dogs will be under lock and key. The owner of the dog(s) will need to provide her with documentation from the Village office stating that the boarding and citation fees have been paid. The dogs will have to be current on rabies vaccination before the dog is released. More discussion followed on the cost and length of impounding dogs. Boarding fees will
